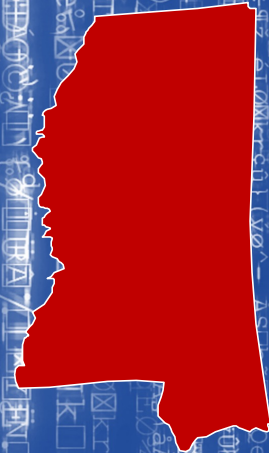

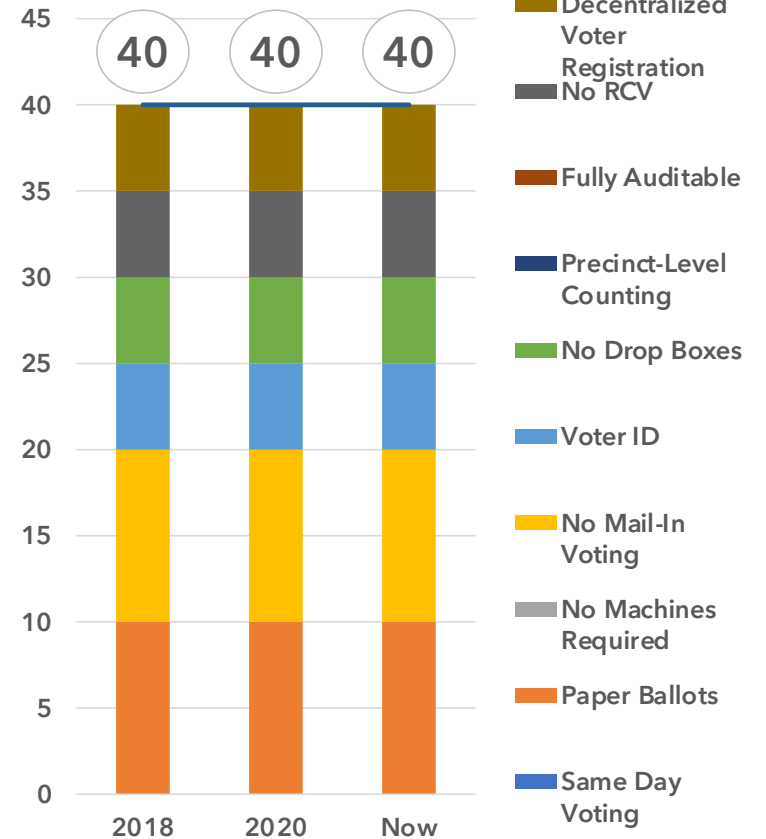

Unfortunately, many of the conservative candidates were knocked out of races because Mississippi still has an open primary where Democrats can vote on the Republican side and vote against the most conservative candidates. I believe there will be a push to get the legislature to hopefully change the law for that.

- While we haven't been able to move from machine counts to hand count, we have discovered helpful information on the Secretary of State's website.
- The County Elections Handbook has a remedy where candidates can hand count the ballots after the election to ensure that the machines counted correctly.
- Most counties do still have machines, so we have contacted every county to inquire about machine testing. We attended our tests & learned that it's not really a test so much as a rehearsal. Everything was already programmed and there was a "test deck" of ballots that were sent to the county officials, origins unknown.
