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Improving Utah's Voting Experience

HB 159 – Amendments to Voter Registration – Rep. Steve Handy

In many ways the administration of the 2016 General Election in Utah was extremely successful. Eighty-two percent of the registered voters in Utah participated in the election—the highest percentage since 1964. For voters within the 21 counties that held their election by-mail, 85 percent of their voters mailed in their ballots and didn't wait a minute in a line on Election Day.

For some Utahns in certain areas throughout the state, though, long lines spoiled their Election Day experience. A primary contributor to this was as a result of voters with outdated registration records. HB 159 – Amendments to Voter Registration addresses the issue of long Election Day lines in a substantial manner. In addition HB 159 streamlines government processes, simplifies the citizen's experience, and reduces ongoing costs associated with voter registration.

Key Provisions

- Information from a Driver License or State ID application, completed by an eligible citizen, will be shared with voter registration offices unless the citizen requests this information not be shared.
- Voter registration data will be transmitted electronically to registration offices, thus eliminating paper forms.
- Address updates with Driver License Division will be provided to registration offices automatically helping keep voter registration records current and reducing the need for last minute voter registration. (80,000 plus registrations state wide in the last week of 2016 registration period)

Further Explanation

- Voter lines during the 2016 General Election were severely impacted by citizens whose registration was not current. These voters voted provisional ballots.
- Twenty percent of voters at Election Day polling locations needed to vote provisionally. These provisional ballots are often the bottleneck that slows the election process, as they require more time to complete.
- The majority of voters who cast provisional ballots during the 2016 General Session used a current driver license as proof of address. HB 159 would have provided the majority of these voters a current and updated voter registration allowing them the ability to vote without requiring the time consuming provisional ballot process.
