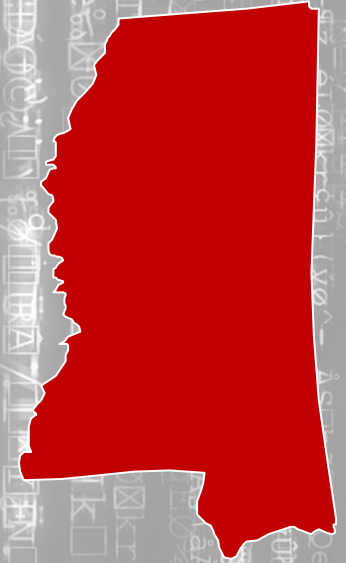

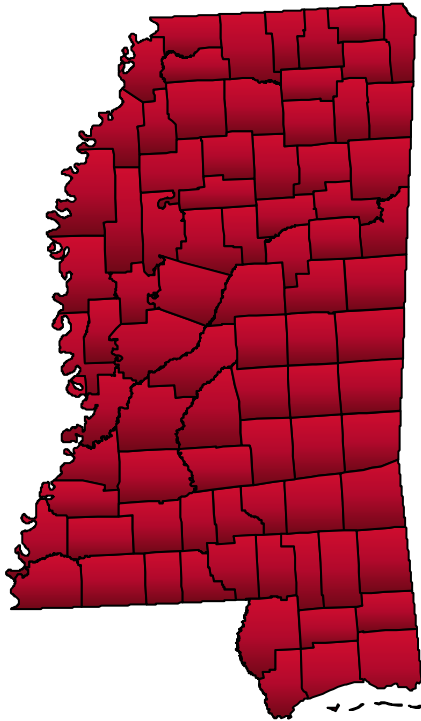

Won by 217,366 votes

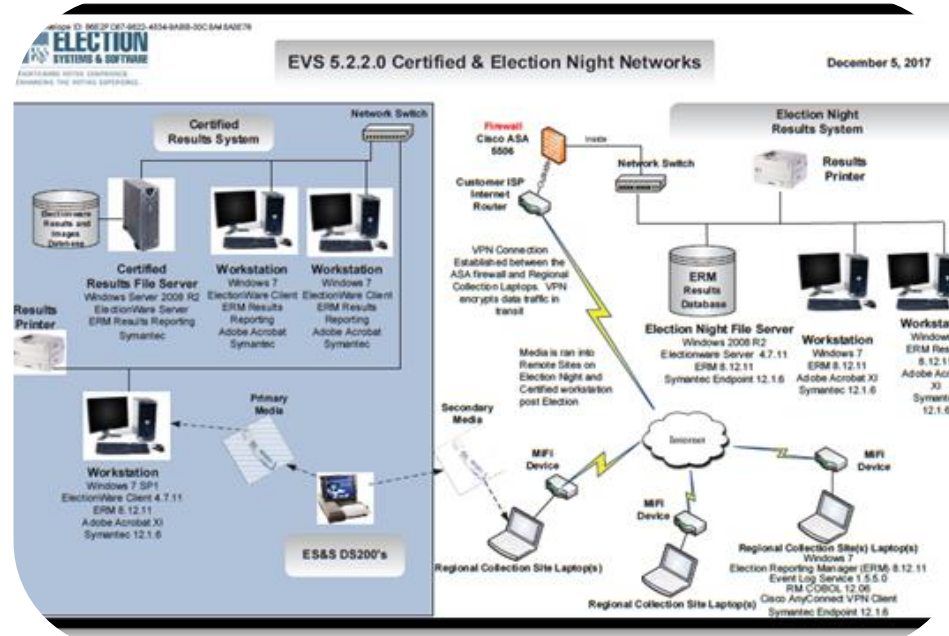



Voting Systems/Devices

Mississippi law does not require any certification of voting systems for use in Mississippi. The Secretary of State's Office does not test, certify, or recommend any voting system. The decision to select a particular type of system rests solely with individual county government.

The Federal Election Commission (FEC) and the National Association of State Elections Directors (NASED) have together with other technical experts developed a **voluntary** voting systems standards program. Most voting systems sold in the United States go through the testing process that is part of this program.

Roadblocks

ELECTED OFFICIALS!

- The county and state officials do not believe the machines could be a problem at all! When asked about how to get rid of machines, no one has a real answer. County officials are belligerent about the suggestion of hand counting ballots.

EVERY COUNTY HAS DIFFERENT OR NO PROCEDURES IN PLACE

- There is no set procedure for testing the machines. There are 12 different types of machines used throughout the state. There is no law requiring counties to test machines AND any updates are administered by the company representatives!

PUBLIC REQUESTS FOR RECORDS ARE SLOWWALKED AND EXPENSIVE.

- Several records requests took many months and did not include the information requested. We requested voter's rolls and it took three months to receive them. The information (like DOB of voter) was not complete and we are still waiting for it. This process started in August of 2021. Often the cost of obtaining records is exorbitant too.

COUNTIES ARE GETTING **MORE** FUNDING TO PURCHASE **MORE** MACHINES!

- Spoke to a Circuit Court Clerk while examining ballots for one of the primary elections and was told that they are shopping for new machines because they got funding to do so. Legislature passed HB 1510 that provides funds to purchase and maintain voting equipment (machines).

Victories

VOTER ROLLS CANVASSING

- We received the voter rolls from the Secretary of State and were able to canvass Pearl River County, MS. We learned that the rolls are very dirty. Pearl River County is one of the most conservative counties in Mississippi.

VOTER ROLL PROBLEMS WE DISCOVERED

- We canvassed addresses based on a program designed by a computer programmer that pinpointed likely addresses with problems. Of approximately 100 addresses, we obtained over 50 affidavits of problems with addresses.

LIST OF ISSUES FOUND

- Biggest problem by far is previous occupants are still registered at address.
- Second problem is votes deleted somewhere in the chain between the voting booth and the Secretary of State's office. Three were found of people who say they voted but the roll said they did not.

ONE SOLUTION IMPLEMENTED

- Voter's Removal from Registration Form added to Real Estate Database for local Board of Realtors. Steps are being taken to add it to systems statewide.
